

Principal's Newsletter: Spring Term

Dear Parents/Carers,

We have come to the end of another busy term at NGA. Students have been working hard and we have had excellent attendance by Year 11 students at our after school revision sessions. The main messages to Y11 students with regards to exam preparation over the Easter holiday are:

- 1. Most students have started revising out of school hours (despite what some may say) **if** you haven't started, you're in the minority.
- 2. Take every opportunity. **Attend all holiday sessions** you are invited to.
- 3. Revise **little and often each day.** Intense cramming won't work and leads to unnecessary stress.
- 4. Build in some relaxation time by reading, doing some exercise, seeing friends or getting some fresh air. It's normal to feel stressed in the lead up to exams so make sure you look after your own mental health or seek support if you need to.

## School Meal update

Following the Easter holidays the school meal price will be rising from £2.25 to £2.40. This will bring us in line with the rest of the schools in North Tyneside who have been charging £2.40 since September 2022. The Free School Meal price will be adjusted to correspond with this. Individual items available at break and lunch will also be increasing, I have attached below an updated tariff.

I would like to also remind parents about school meal payment arrangements. School meal accounts must be topped up before your child attempts to purchase items in the dining hall. We ask parents to ensure that accounts are topped up no later than **10am** if you want your child to access the dining hall that day for break or lunch, to avoid any embarrassment at the till. As with any cash transfer, the payment is not always instant and can take some time to come through to the till so it is important that the payment is made in advance and not at the time of attempted purchase.

We would also like to remind parents that all students are entitled to a free breakfast between 8-8.30am when we have bagels, fruit juice and a selection of cereals available.

## **Key Points for Uniform**

- 1. **Trousers:** School trousers should be traditional formal black dress trousers. They should not be denim, leggings, linen or cargo-type. Likewise they should not be skin tight and should not resemble jeans. The school is aware that some shops are now advertising and selling 'school uniform' trousers that do not match our definition of formal dress trousers. We ask that parents/carers check this carefully before making purchases.
- 2. **Skirts:** Skirts must be knee-length and tailored. No stretch material or skin-tight material is permitted. Students must wear black, plain tights with skirts.
- 3. Footwear: Students are required to wear smart, plain black, formal school shoes/ankle shoes. Shoes must be polishable over their entire surface with a traditional sole and be plain black and carry no logos. Black trainers that have the appearance of school shoes are not acceptable. Trainers are not permitted unless there is medical exemption from a doctor. The school reserves the right to determine what shoes are acceptable designs. Parents/carers should be aware that many retailers advertise school shoes which are not in line with the school's expectations on footwear. We ask that parents/carers check this carefully before making purchases.

Uniform is checked by staff on a daily basis. If your child attends school in non-uniform items without suitable explanation from a parent/carer (by telephone/letter) sanctions will be imposed.

In addition to the above, the following infringements may also result in your child receiving sanctions:

- Inappropriate hair colour/haircut. The school reserve the right to determine what is considered "inappropriate";
- Nail extensions/false nails;
- Excessive make up. Subtle make up is acceptable and should be natural in colour. False eyelashes and false tan are not allowed. Excessive make up must be removed;
- Jewellery. The only jewellery allowed to be worn in school is a watch and one plain ear stud in each earlobe only. For obvious reasons of safety and risk of personal loss, jewellery other than these should not be worn to school. Should a student choose to wear items of jewellery the school will confiscate these items, parents/carers will be expected to collect these from school.

We have a uniform recycle scheme at the academy and ask parents to donate any unwanted uniform to us so that it can be redistributed to families who may need it.






## Spanish Pen Pals




# **PRAISE & Rewards**

# World Kindness Month and LGBTQ+ History Month






We also celebrated International Women's Day across school, with several subjects studying extraordinary women, female role models and female empowerment.
